### Dear Friends of Iron Gate,

It is hard to believe that on August 26, we celebrated 3 years in our new beautiful building on Archer! (Thank you to Andy's Frozen Custard for the cold treats we distributed to our guests!) We continue to be grateful for our beautiful facility that allows us to serve our guests with dignity and respect. In August we served 17,927 meals, which averages about 578 plates a day to approximately 275 guests a day. Our culinary team works hard to prepare nutritious and delicious meals for our guests.

I am always humbled and grateful for the gifts Iron Gate receives to help us keep feeding those in need, from the dollar bills folded up in an envelope to the checks that make you weep with joy. Every gift matters! Iron Gate was recently honored at Tulsa Elks Lodge #946 dinner with a grant to fight food insecurity. Cari and I met up with the Iron Rockets International Motorcycle Club on Route 66 and received a donation from their members that came to Oklahoma from Germany, Aruba, Tennessee, Florida, Texas and places in between. Every day is a new day at Iron Gate and the most fun is answering phone calls about food donations – in one week, I think we received calls as varied as someone moving and cleaning out their pantry to pallets of assorted beverages from Coca Cola Southwest Beverages, 50 dozen Hurt's donuts to bulk food products from a delayed opening in Owasso – all of these things help stretch our food dollars and provide variety for our guests. Thank you to everyone who thinks of Iron Gate when they have food to share.

I often receive gratitude from those we serve. Every morning guests go through the line, they thank volunteers, some pick up plates to say thank you and some just quietly smile. The pantry line is brimming with thank you's, a few tears and hand written notes, but YOU are the true recipient of these kind words, because without your support, Iron Gate would not be able to serve those in need. Your generosity allowed us to serve 3,242 households with approximately 53,612 pounds of groceries in August via drive-thru pantry, outreach bags and agency pick-up. With the economy uncertain, gas prices fluctuating and back-to-school around the corner, the need continues and Iron Gate stands ready.

We are looking forward to our Cooking For A Cause fundraiser that will be Thursday, October 6 at a new location, The Vista21. This is a fun evening featuring food, wine, a gift card pull, mystery boxes, photo booth and an auction to raise operating funds for Iron Gate. Local chefs will prepare their favorite dish and compete for the coveted people's choice prize! I hope you will join us, it truly is "the tastiest way to help feed the hungry!"

#### INSIDE THE GATE

The story of Iron Gate is one of observation, kindness, respect and progression. Iron Gate started because of a simple act of generosity. Iron Gate's founders, Keenan Barnard, Gene Buzzard and Father Jack Powers stepped out of a Bible study at Trinity Episcopal Church to make a homeless man a sandwich. That simple act launched an organization that now feeds hundreds of people every day.

Iron Gate began serving hot meals from the basement of Trinity Episcopal Church in 1979. Seven years later, bags of groceries were added to the hot meals and the Grocery Pantry was born.

Today's Grocery Pantry has a very different look and scope from the pantry of 1986. Kid's Packs were added to the mix in 2009. Kid's Packs provide an extra amount of nutrition and a way to provide children a small treat when treats are often few and far between.

Currently, Iron Gate distributes groceries to guests through a drive-through pantry three days a week and 'walker bags' go out at the same time to guests who are in the area, but without a car or a kitchen.

Working with community partners, outreach bags are delivered offsite three times a week to Tulsa's homeless living in encampments throughout the city. Case Workers from partner agencies, pick up groceries weekly for their clients, and most recently, to assist Case Workers with their schedules, we have begun utilizing Door Dash's non-profit program for free delivery to guests. Continuing to evolve, the Grocery Pantry is looking at offering a hybrid program that will provide a self-select model in addition to drive-through. Self-select will allow our guests to come into the pantry and select the products in a store-shopping experience., which is how pantry was set up pre-pandemic. There are no restrictions or requirements to receive groceries from Iron Gate. Grocery distributions average 31 pounds per household, providing families with milk, protein, and fresh fruits and vegetables.

The experience of the pandemic, along with instability and inflation, has exacerbated the issue of food insecurity. Before the pandemic, approximately 15% of people in our state didn't have enough food. Feeding America now projects that number to be one in five Oklahomans. The statistics are even more dire for Oklahoma children. One in four children is projected to not have enough food to eat.









The last three years has seen a steady increase in need. The Grocery Pantry served 10,140 households in 2019; in 2021 the number rose to 30,108, tripling impact and reach. Already in the first seven months of 2022, we have seen a 16% increase in service over last year.

The food distributed through Iron Gate's Grocery Pantry comes from various sources: Food Drives, The Food Bank and retail pickups. Two years ago we were picking up approximately eight-thousand pounds of groceries monthly from retailers. Today that number has risen to up to thirty-thousand pounds monthly. The increase in the number of retailers and stops every week has required a heavier load in operations and scheduling. Much of this increase is due to Iron Gate's continued operation throughout Covid. As other agencies reduced staff and operations, Iron Gate continued 365 days a year throughout the pandemic.

The Grocery Pantry, through its many iterations, continues to provide assistance, healthy food options and hope to those who are food-insecure. A monthly visit to Iron Gate's Grocery Pantry may not end hunger, but at a time when so much is difficult, receiving groceries is a welcome relief, a significant assistance and one less worry for those struggling to make ends meet.

# FACES Campaign

For the last eleven years, Iron Gate has given the problem of hunger and homelessness a face. Through our FACES campaign, we have shown Tulsans that the hungry in our city are not simply anonymous numbers; they are people. People with lives, relationships, challenges and dreams.

Working with talented and giving photographers, Iron Gate has photographed and documented almost one hundred individuals since 2011. FACES aims to raise awareness of the mission of Iron Gate to feed the hungry and homeless in Tulsa and, through portraiture, to humanize those in need.

This year's FACES shoot was held in August. The 2022 photographer contributing his time and expertise is Tulsan Shane Bevel. Shane is an editorial and commercial photographer documenting the activities of his clients and friends in Tulsa and beyond. After more than a decade of staff work for newspapers across the southern states, he turned to freelance work and has been making beautiful images of amazing people for wonderful clients over the last 14 years. He lives in midtown Tulsa with his wife Fran Bevel and his two children Graham and Ruby. When not working or volunteering, Shane spends as much time outdoors with his family as possible, knowing that the key to understanding ourselves is to feel small in this immense world we occupy.

The exhibit, along with the stories of the featured guests will be shown at an opening and Open House at Iron Gate on Tuesday, November 8. FACES provides a snapshot into the diverse lives of our guests. While it by no means tells the full story of their experiences, it does provide a glimpse into their journeys and reveals a little of what Iron Gate means to those who we help feed every day.



## **Volunteers are the Heart of Iron Gate**


