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Dear Friends of Iron Gate –

How do you even summarize a year like this year? It was a roller coaster—full of many highs and lows, but overall, it left us feeling stronger, and maybe a little tired. From the unknown in March, as things slowly shut down, to the cautious re-openings, and life as we now know it, it has been a ride.

A thank you, first and foremost, to the Iron Gate board and staff. To the board, for supporting the staff and encouraging us to stay safe. To the staff who has worked tirelessly to make sure the hungry and homeless are getting fed EVERYDAY-I will never forget those days, when there was so much uncertainty and the staff just persevered. The one thing we know for sure, is people need food and we have delivered. And so much gratitude, tears of relief and words and notes expressing thanks. We have seen it all.

Iron Gate has answered the call and worked with other agencies to provide solutions to new challenges created by the pandemic. We are providing meals at the temporary shelter that is managed by the Day Center, Mental Health Association of Oklahoma and Salvation Army. We have partnered with DVIS, Community Service Council and Family & Children Services to provide groceries for clients living in hotels and outreach teams seeing clients who are sheltering in place. We were called to do more and we are.

We know the recovery will take time, but we have seen the resilience in the faces of our guests. We will continue to serve and look for ways to innovate in the delivery of our services. We are humbled by the meal guest who received an unexpected windfall and shared his bounty with us. We are in awe of the previous pantry guest, who upon receiving her Christmas gift, bought groceries to give to Iron Gate. We are amazed by the church community, who brings donuts for our guests every Sunday, but also brought gift cards for every staff member to acknowledge their service. And we are so thankful for the restaurant that is still adapting to their new normal, but still took time this holiday season to donate cooking staples to the Iron Gate kitchen. There truly are a million stories at Iron Gate, each one restoring our faith in humanity and reassuring us that we will get through this together.

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THANKSGIVING BLESSINGS

It was looking like a bleak Thanksgiving for so many families struggling to make ends meet. The pandemic and economic downturn continued and many couldn't put food on the table for dinner, let alone a Thanksgiving feast. But Iron Gate and Lawyers Fighting Hunger once again worked together to put the turkey in Thanksgiving for 1,000 Tulsa families.

"We weren't going to let Covid-19 stop us," Lawyers Fighting Hunger Founder, **Hugh** Robert, said. "We knew the need would be greater than ever this year. So we were determined to figure out a way we could provide turkey dinners to people in a safe way."

In the past, the turkey distribution occurred all in one day with hundreds of people waiting in line to receive their holiday dinners. In order to abide by Covid-19 safety precautions, the turkey distribution was spread over several days and handed out through Iron Gate's low-contact drive-through grocery pantries.

"Iron Gate has been doing drive-through grocery pantries since March, so we thought this was the best way to distribute the turkey dinners this year," said Iron Gate Executive Director, Carrie Vesely Henderson. "Our grocery pantry program is up more than 90% over last year, so we know the need is real. And we're so grateful to Lawyers Fighting Hunger for providing this special turkey dinner for pantry recipients."

Lawyers Fighting Hunger purchased 1,000 turkey dinners with trimmings. They recruited 57 volunteers to pack more than 14.5 tons of food. Together, Iron Gate and Lawyers Fighting Hunger provided 18 social service agencies with 589 turkey dinners for their clients.

Then, Iron Gate distributed the remaining 411 turkey dinners to our guests over four days. Many of these guests wouldn't have had a turkey dinner this holiday without your support.

"Thank you so much for blessing my family. You made this truly a Thanksgiving," said the Crawford Family, who visited Iron Gate's grocery pantry the week before Thanksgiving.

"Thanks for the Thanksgiving blessing. Me and my family will be able to have a good meal," said another Iron Gate guest.

2020 marks the 11th year that Iron Gate has worked with Lawyers Fighting Hunger to provide turkey dinners for our neighbors in need. The groups have worked together to provide 8,175 turkey dinners since 2010. They also team up in the spring to provide ham dinners.

The mayor of Tulsa declared Friday, November 20th Lawyers Fighting Hunger Day in honor of the groups' commitment to provide holiday dinners to our neighbors in need.

HOLLYFRONTIER SPREADS CHEER

"This is one of those calls you never expect to get, but you're so thrilled when you do," said Carrie Vesely Henderson, Iron Gate's Executive Director. "I was just tallying the bills for our grocery program, when I got this call from HollyFrontier. I mean it was right on time."

Seven hundred Tulsa families will have a happier holiday thanks to a Tulsa oil refinery. HollyFrontier is spreading a little holiday cheer by donating \$15,000 to Iron Gate. The gift will underwrite groceries for 700 Tulsa families struggling with food insecurity.

HollyFrontier employees also put together 2,500 kid's packs for Iron Gate's youngest guests. Kid's packs are quart-sized bags of kid-friendly snacks, like juice boxes, crackers, and granola bars. Iron Gate provides a kid's pack for every child who comes for the community meal and every parent who comes for groceries takes a kid's pack home for each child in their home. Iron Gate has distributed more than 14,000 kid's packs this year.



"We know that the COVID-19 pandemic has been especially hard on our most vulnerable families and that is why we partnered with Iron Gate," said Skipp Kistler, Vice President and Refinery Manager, HollyFrontier Tulsa. "We wanted to bring a ray of hope to people in need this holiday season. The funds were

made possible in lieu of our annual holiday party and our employees are grateful for the opportunity to give back."

"This gift will provide 700 families with 21,000 pounds of groceries and 2,500 children with snacks. HollyFrontier will make the holidays a lot merrier for a lot of people," Henderson said.

RESTAURANT PARTNER GIVES BACK

Iron Gate chef friend, Justin Thompson, is ending the year by doing good. His restaurant group in partnership with US Foods and Straight Line Paint & Remodel launched Dining for Dinners program this holiday season.

For everyone who dines at Prhyme Steakhouse, Iron Gate will receive a pound and a half of food.

"We're very excited to be launching a new initiative to help supply non-perishable foods to those in need. Until December 31st of this year, Justin Thompson Restaurants will donate one pound of food for each person who dines at PRHYME Steakhouse, each gift card sold, and each take out meal ordered. In addition, Straight Line Paint & Remodel and its principal, Stan Roper, will match 50% of each donation," Justin Thompson said.

"Based upon our daily numbers and what we anticipate over the holiday season, we could be looking at donating 350-500 pounds of food [to Iron Gate] per week from now until the end of the year. That will make a huge difference to this organization that has been stressed with the demand that this year has brought," Thompson added.

In the first three weeks of Dining for Dinners, Iron Gate received more than 1,000 pounds of pasta, beans, rice, potatoes, chicken broth and cream of mushroom soup.

Another Justin Thompson Restaurant is also supporting the Community Food Bank of Eastern Oklahoma.

CELEBRATING NATIVE HERITAGE

November is Native American Heritage Month. Since 2009, Iron Gate has celebrated with FRYBREAD! Frybread is a common dish found across most tribal nations and enjoyed by everyone. Frybread is the foundation for the "Indian" taco. Traditionally, Native Americans from all over Oklahoma would travel in the early hours to Iron Gate to prepare and serve frybread and Indian Tacos to our brothers and sisters. This year looked a little different.

Nowadays, anyone can search the internet for frybread recipes and how-to videos but it will never be the same as being made with love by a Frybread Diva! Debbie Ridge, a.k.a Frybread Diva, is an award-winning frybread-maker and a citizen of the Muscogee (Creek) Nation, who has been making frybread for family, friends, federal officials, and celebrities for years. However, the Frybread Diva's favorite time to make frybread is for the guests of Iron Gate. The first year she was asked to make frybread for Iron Gate the request was for 1,000 pieces. Debbie did not hesitate and said, "I know I can do it, but let's try to find some help." Help came from far and wide, youth and elders, male and female—all the frybread-



makers and helpers wanted the guests of Iron Gate to know they were not forgotten and preparing frybread was one simple gesture to honor all.

Native American Day 2020 at Iron Gate was still a success although we could not all gather to prepare the frybread and serve the Indian Taco meal as we normally would. The challenge was finding local frybread-makers to make the frybread and deliver

to Iron Gate by 7:30am. The original plans included at least 10 frybread-makers to meet the challenge. Well, the best made plans sometimes fall short. By midnight, the day of Native American Day at Iron Gate, we were down to 1 frybread-maker, the Diva herself, Debbie Ridge. In her prime, this would not have been a challenge for Debbie but in 2017 she had a kidney transplant and that was the only year she missed making frybread at Iron Gate. Debbie knew the guests of Iron Gate would be looking forward to Indian Tacos so she prayed over it and said again, "I know I can do it." Debbie sent her daughter on a midnight run to find an open grocery store with enough flour and oil to make the needed frybread. After 1am, Debbie and her daughter started to make the frybread so it would be hot and fresh for the 7:30am delivery to Iron Gate. Although Debbie did not get to see the guests enjoy her frybread, her heart was full knowing once again they would be served a meal with love and prayers as the main ingredients.

Cherrah Giles used to work for Iron Gate before she moved to Virginia. Even from thousands of miles away, she still helps organize Native American celebrations for Iron Gate guests. Her mother is the Frybread Diva.

SCARING AWAY HUNGER

Thanks for scaring away hunger this Halloween. Iron Gate held its first Halloween food drive on Saturday, October 31st. About 70 cars participated in the drive-through food drop-off, providing thousands of pounds of food for Iron Gate's grocery pantry program. Dozens of folks also participated online. All in all, Iron Gate collected more than **5,500 pounds** of food.

Iron Gate staff, dressed in Halloween costumes, collected more than two and a half tons of food during their first Halloween food drive.
