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

### HUNGER IN A PANDEMIC

Our programs—daily community meal and emergency grocery pantry—are open and operating. Iron Gate has transitioned to providing carry—out meals in the morning. Iron Gate has moved to a low—contact drive—through/walk—through pantry to encourage social distancing, while providing 25—35 pounds of groceries per household. Iron Gate has seen demand for our services dramatically increased over the last five months. And we're able to meet that increased demand because of your support. Iron Gate served 41% more meals over the same time period last year.



"Especially inside...I was amazed. It's beautiful." Life has been hard since the pandemic struck. "It's been kinda crazy. A lot fewer places you can go. A lot of different rules. Some places it's like it's not worth it to go to." But she's at Iron Gate almost every day for her carry-out meal. "You don't know how many lives you're changing and how many people you're helping just by giving them a smile and a warm meal."



### **CARLOS & FAMILY**

Carlos is a family man. He dotes on his teenaged daughters and six-year-old son. And being out of work is tough on this father who prides himself on taking care of his family. He lost his job in Kansas and recently moved to Oklahoma to find work. You can see the love tinged with worry as he watched his family getting their portrait taken. He says they're happy and doing the best they can. And he was grateful to Iron Gate for loading him up with groceries. It's not just food on the table. It's the fuel he needs to keep looking for a way to provide for his family.





## ROBERT

One of the most soul-wrenching things about homelessness is the act of not being seen. Robert says that doesn't happen to him at Iron Gate. He walks with a limp and sometimes struggles with his words, but he says at Iron Gate he doesn't feel judged. "These guys they do like Jesus does: Look at the inside of your body instead of the outside. These guys they try to look at your heart instead of the outside of your body. And that's what Jesus does."



#### RODNEY

You can always go home again. During this global pandemic, that adage seems to be true for many. We've heard again and again about adult children, returning to their parents' homes often with their own children in tow. That's Rodney's story. He's never needed help. But with his adult son and granddaughter at home, things are tight. So he brought his son to Iron Gate to show him help is out there.



### LISA

Lisa almost didn't participate in Faces of Iron Gate. But her gratitude outweighed her reluctance. This woman is a portrait of resilience. She's struggled with homelessness and battled addiction for decades. But six years ago, she got clean and got her life back on track. She was working, sharing an apartment with her brother, when the pandemic struck. "We were doing the best we could until this Covid thing come along and it just messed with everybody. It's taken a lot of people down." Lisa smiled through her tears as she expressed her gratitude for Iron Gate during her time of need. "You guys [Iron Gate] are a blessing. You help the homeless. I've been homeless before. I haven't since I've been up here and I'm not going to be. I'm clean, I've got God in my life and I can work. I appreciate you guys doing what you do because I don't like asking for help and you guys have given me help."
